### MEDICARE PART D CREDITABLE COVERAGE NOTICE

# For Medicare Eligible Participants

## **About Your Prescription Drug Coverage and Medicare**

Your Employer is sending you this notice because you have a Medical policy that includes benefits for prescription drugs. Now that Medicare Part D is available, Medicare Eligible individuals have more choices in prescription drug coverage. If you are not Medicare eligible, and none of your covered family members are Medicare eligible, no action is required on your part.

<u>Medicare Eligible Members</u>: Read this notice carefully - it explains the options you have under Medicare prescription drug coverage, and can help you decide whether or not you want to enroll.

Please read this notice carefully and <u>keep</u> it where you can find it. This notice has information about your current prescription drug coverage with your Employer for people who are Medicare eligible or will becoming Medicare eligible. It also tells you where to find more information to help you make decisions about your prescription drug coverage. This information can help you decide whether or not you want to join a Medicare drug plan. If you are considering joining, you should compare your current coverage, including which drugs are covered at what cost, with the coverage and costs of the plans offering Medicare prescription drug coverage in your area. Information about where you can get help to make decisions about your prescription drug coverage is at the end of the notice. There are two important things you need to know about your current coverage and Medicare's prescription drug coverage:

- 1. Medicare prescription drug coverage became available in 2006 to everyone with Medicare. You can get this coverage if you join a Medicare Prescription Drug Plan or join a Medicare Advantage Plan (like an HMO or PPO) that offers prescription drug coverage. All Medicare drug plans provide at least a standard level of coverage set by Medicare. Some plans may also offer more coverage for a higher monthly premium.
- 2. Your Employer has determined that the prescription drug coverage offered by Your Employer is, on average for all plan participants, expected to pay out as much as standard Medicare prescription drug coverage pays, and is therefore **considered Creditable Coverage**. Because your existing coverage is Creditable Coverage, you can keep this coverage and not pay a higher premium (a penalty) if you later decide to join a Medicare drug plan.

It has been determined that the prescription drug coverage offered in the Your Employer's Sponsored Medical Plan is, on average for all plan participants, expected to pay out as much as the standard Medicare prescription drug coverage will pay, and is Creditable Coverage.

Because your existing coverage is on average at least as good as standard Medicare prescription drug coverage, you can keep this coverage and not pay extra if you later decide to enroll in Medicare coverage.

### When Can You Join A Medicare Drug Plan?

You can join a Medicare drug plan when you first become eligible for Medicare and each year from **October 15**<sup>th</sup> **to December 7**<sup>th</sup>. However, if you lose your current creditable prescription drug coverage, through no fault of your own, you will also be eligible for a two (2) month Special Enrollment Period (SEP) to join a Medicare drug plan.

If you drop your Employer health plan coverage and you choose to wait to join a Medicare drug plan, you may pay a higher premium (a penalty) if you join later. You may pay that higher premium (penalty) as long as you have Medicare prescription drug coverage. However, if you lose creditable prescription drug coverage, through no fault of you own, you will be eligible for a sixty (60) day Special Enrollment Period (SEP) because you lost creditable coverage to join a Part D plan. In addition, if you lose or decide to leave the Employer sponsored health coverage; you will be eligible to join a Part D plan at that time using an Employer Group Special Enrollment Period. You should compare your current coverage, including which drugs are covered, with the coverage and cost of the plans offering Medicare prescription drug coverage in your area.

You should also know that if you drop or lose your coverage with Your Employer and do not enroll in a Medicare drug plan within 63 continuous days after your current coverage ends, your monthly premium may go up by at least 1% of the Medicare base beneficiary premium per month for every month that you did not have that coverage.

For example, if you go nineteen months without coverage, your premium will always be at least 19% higher than what most other people pay. You will have to pay this higher premium as long as you have Medicare prescription drug coverage. In addition, you may have to wait until next October to enroll.

Your current coverage pays for other health expenses, in addition to prescription drugs, and you will still be eligible to receive all of your current health and prescription drug benefits if you choose to enroll in a Stand-alone Medicare prescription drug plan. If you decide to drop Your Employer Sponsored Medical plan with prescription drug coverage, be aware that you may not be able to get this coverage back.

Remember: Keep this Creditable Coverage notice. If you decide to join one of the Medicare drug plans, you may be required to provide a copy of this notice when you join to show whether or not you have maintained creditable coverage and whether or not you are required to pay a higher premium (a penalty).
